An Bord Altranais report of the year 2009



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presidential address

DURING 2009 THE BOARD and Executive discussed the detailed response made in 2008 to the draft Heads of Bill for the proposed new Nurses and Midwives legislation, which will replace the Nurses Act, 1985 with the Department of Health and Children on a number of occasions and the Board are committed to working with the Minister and her officials in developing the new legislation. The Board welcomes the stated objective of the new legislation to protect the public in its dealings with both professions and to ensure the integrity of the professions through the promotion of high standards of education, training, practice and professional conduct.

An Bord Altranais celebrated 50 years of Regulating Intellectual Disability Nursing in September 2009. The celebrations took the form of an academic seminar with presentations delivered by Dr. John Sweeney, Senior Lecturer, School of Nursing and Midwifery, University College Cork and Ms. Ciara O'Keefe, Clinical Nurse Manager, St. Vincent's Centre, Navan Road, Dublin 7.

The seminar was followed by the unveiling of a specially commissioned tapestry depicting the mission and values of An Bord Altranais. The tapestry was designed and made by clients of Stewarts of Kilcloon, Co. Meath and was unveiled by Ms. Mary Davis, Managing Director Special Olympics Europe/Eurasia. Invitations to the seminar and the unveiling were extended to approximately 60 people representing the Higher Education Institutions that provide pre-registration education programmes in Intellectual Disability Nursing, associated health care agencies, clients of Stewarts of Kilcloon and other leaders in the field. The tapestry is now framed and situated in the foyer of An Bord Altranais.

I am pleased to report that the Evaluation of An Bord Altranais Regulatory Framework for Prescriptive Authority report was presented to the Minister for Health and Children on the 9th October 2009 at a National launch in The Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. The National launch of the Board's evaluation report was in association with University College Dublin study National Independent Evaluation of the Nursing and Midwife Prescribing Initiative, which was commissioned and funded by the Health Service Executive on behalf of the National Resource and Implementation Group on Nurse and Midwife Prescribing in Ireland.

I am pleased to report that in 2009 the Board completed a project to develop professional guidance for nurses working with older people. The document published in April, 2009 is a guide for nurses in all healthcare settings where the older person is cared for. It will also serve as a source of information for the public by detailing for them the nursing care they are entitled to and should expect to receive. A copy of the document was sent to all registered nurses and midwives. An Bord Altranais published a leaflet for the public in September 2009 entitled "Nursing Care of Older People – What to expect from your nursing care" to support the "Professional Guidance for Nurses working with Older People" published in April 2009. Both documents were formed by an extensive consultation exercise that included service users, the profession and key stakeholders. The steering committee to develop the guidance was chaired by Mr. John Murray, Vice-President, An Bord Altranais.

In 2009 the Education Department continued with the ongoing schedule of site visits and course approvals. The Nursing Careers Centre (NCC) continued to play a significant role in promoting nursing as a career. I am pleased to report that in 2009 a total of 9,457 individuals applied for 1,570 places on the various nursing programmes, including 1,858 mature applicants.

A major challenge continues to be the numbers of nurses wishing to register in Ireland, notwithstanding the significant fall off of non EU applications. In 2009 the Board received 2,670 applications for registration, compared with 3,851 applications in 2008. Of this, the number of applications from non EU applicants dropped from 845 in 2008 to 302 in 2009. The number of nurses/midwives on the Baord's active Register now stands at 68,483.

The Board continues to process a large numbers of Fitness to Practise applications. In 2009 the Board received 67 new applications and carried over a further 31 applications from 2008. Of these 79 cases were dealt with and 19 cases were still under consideration at the end of the year. The cost of processing Fitness to Practise cases is significant and continues to be monitored by the Board.

I want to acknowledge our continuing close working relationship with the Department of Health and Children and in particular the Nursing Policy Division. I very much appreciate the co-operation and expert assistance we received from the National Council for the Professional Development of Nursing and Midwifery, Health Service Executive, voluntary hospitals, nursing and midwifery planning and development units and the Higher Education Institutions.

My final thanks go to the Chief Executive Officer and all his staff at An Bord Altranais for their work in administering the affairs of the Board with great professional competency.

education and training

An Bord Altranais promotes high standards of professional education, training and practice and professional conduct among nurses and midwives to ensure the protection of the public. In the Education and Training functions assigned to it, it has continued to prescribe the manner in which and the conditions under which the registration/degree programme for General, Psychiatric and Intellectual Disability Divisions of the Register of Nurses from 2002, and a Children's and General Nursing (Integrated) programme and Midwifery programme in 2006 are provided. An Bord Altranais continued throughout 2009 to be proactive, guiding, supportive and responsive to the changing educational structures and processes that support the registration programmes in nursing. An Bord Altranais also embraced opportunities to develop, extend and strengthen the principle of partnership with all parties involved in the educational experience while maintaining its statutory independence in conducting on-site visits to the Higher Education Institutions and the linked health care services. The concern of An Bord Altranais in the protection of the public acknowledges the issue of quality in education, actual clinical practice of nurses and midwives and the need for practice to be grounded in appropriate current evidence.

In keeping with its responsibility for protecting the public the Board continues its commitment to the effectiveness and efficiency of its approval processes. The Board through its quality of education framework continued its monitoring and evaluation role of standards in practice for the education and training of nurses and midwives throughout 2009.

An Bord Altranais operationalises this process through the Nurses Rules (2007) made under the Nurses Act, 1985 setting standards to be adhered to in the education and training of nurses and in their continuing education as registered nurses. The rules provide for the approval of higher education institutions and of hospitals and health care institutions providing training to ensure that valuable clinical and theoretical experience is provided. The various aspects of the regulatory functions being carried out are illustrated as follows:

Site visits to healthcare institutions and linked third level institutions

Under Section 34 of the Nurses Act, 1985 the Board is required to satisfy itself as to the adequacy and suitability of hospitals and institutions for nurse education and training at least once every five years.

On-site visits to Higher Education Institutions and Healthcare Institutions are required as a component of determining "the suitability of third level institutions and health care institutions in respect of educational programmes leading to registration" (Requirements and Standards for Nurse Registration Education Programmes, February 2005).

The focus of the site visit through a partnership approach is to:

 Assess that all statutory and regulatory requirements of An Bord Altranais and the European Directives are met.

- Assess the effectiveness and efficiency of the curriculum structures, processes and outcomes
- Assess the quality and appropriateness of the educational experiences

Post Registration Courses

The Board approves post-registration education courses for nurses and midwives based on criteria formulated in 1989. These criteria divide courses into two categories.

Post-Registration Category I Courses

Post Registration Category I courses include in-service education, seminars, study days, conferences and continued professional development (CPD) programmes that are not accredited by an academic awarding body, university or college.

An Bord Altranais revised the policy and guidelines to education programme developers and providers intending to submit short education and learning programmes for An Bord Altranais approval. These courses are considered central to the continued development and maintenance of knowledge, skills and competencies for practice within a rapidly changing health care environment. All learning should support the concepts of critical thinking, reflective practice, problem solving and lifelong learning in professional practice.

A new policy was approved by the Board following a consultation with the Directors of the Centres of Nursing and Midwifery Education and became effective from 1st May 2009. It replaced the previous An Bord Altranais policy in relation to Category 1 approval. The policy document provides detailed guidance for education and programme providers regarding submission requirements including an application form based on the submission structure. The policy will be reviewed in May 2010.

In 2009 An Bord Altranais approved 386 Post Registration Category 1 courses.

Post-Registration Category II Courses

Post-Registration Category II courses are specialist education courses for nurses and midwives that support practice development and service need and exclude those which lead to registration. These courses are considered by the Education and Training Committee and approval is granted if programmes meet the criteria of the Education and Training Committee.

An Bord Altranais National Conference

The National Conference entitled *Caring for and about the Older Person: Professional Guidance for Nurses Working with Older People* was held on the 26th May in Dublin. Two hundred and fifty two individuals' applications were accepted to attend. In addition to this a reserve list in excess of 150 applications to attend was filed in the office. In excess of 240 delegates registered on the day.

"Professional Guidance for Nurses working with Older People" (An Bord Altranais, April 2009) was officially launched by the Minister for State Mr. John Moloney at the conference. Every nurse on the register received a copy of the Guidance document.

European Council of Nursing Regulators (FEPI)

The General Assembly of FEPI was held on 12-13th November 2009 in Rome. An Bord Altranais was represented by Mrs. Anne Carrigy, President, Mr Eugene Donoghue, Chief Executive Officer and Dr. Anne-Marie Ryan, Chief Education Officer.

An Bord Altranais is a founding member of FEPI. The primary aim of FEPI is to protect the European citizens by securing excellence in

- Nursing education, competencies and practice
- Professional standards
- Continuous education and training

• Codes of practice.

At the meeting held in Rome on November 12th, FEPI's members elected a new six-strong Executive Board, responsible for setting FEPI's strategic direction. An Bord Altranais President, Mrs Anne Carrigy, was elected President of the European Council of Nursing Regulators (FEPI).

An Bord Altranais hosted the Working Group on Education, Training and Competences on the 8th April 2009 to consider a proposal for amending Directive 2005/36/EC Annex 5.2.1. Also discussed was accreditation and recognition of learning in light of Directive 2005/36/EC. Representatives from five countries travelled to the meeting.

Library

The Library continued to provide the following services:

- British Nursing Index (BNI) and CINAHL databases via the internet plus online access to the Cochrane Library and PubMed.
- Reference services for nurses and midwives studying, practising or seeking information for interview preparation.
- Document supply via the British Library and the Irish Healthcare Library network to staff.

Nursing Careers Centre

The Nursing Careers Centre (NCC) was set up under the management of An Bord Altranais in November 1998. Its main functions relate to:

- · Assessment of mature code applicants to nursing/midwifery
- · Promotion and marketing of nursing/midwifery as a career
- Provision of information to registered nurses and midwives.

In carrying out its functions, the NCC continues to work closely with a number of key stakeholders, including: the Department of Health and Children; the health care sector; the Public Appointments Service (PAS); the Central Applications Office (CAO); the higher education institutions (HEIs); the Institute of Guidance Counsellors (IGC); the nursing promotion and marketing liaison group set up by the NCC, and others from time to time.

The NCC carries out its work in an open and transparent manner, with efficient and clear communication as its keynotes, and with due cognisance to the principle of cost effectiveness. The NCC communicates with the key stakeholders in reviewing its processes.

Applications to nursing/midwifery places

The number of applications to nursing in 2009 continued to be high, with a total of 9,457 individual

applicants for 1,570 places (reduced by 310 places from 2008 allocation). The breakdown of applications and places (which includes applications for more than one place) was as follows:

Mature code applicants

Mature code applicants remained high. Of the 1858 mature code applicants who were called for written assessment, 923 were successful and were called for interview. 762 were successful at interview and placed on an order of merit list for each course for which he/she applied. Not everyone on the order of merit lists received an offer of a place. There was a quota of places for mature code applicants: 15% of places in general nursing; 35% in psychiatric nursing; 35% in intellectual disability nursing; 20% in midwifery; and 15% in children's and general (integrated). Offers commenced in July.

Marketing and promotion of nursing/midwifery as a career

The NCC pursued an active marketing and promotional campaign in 2009, despite a notification of reduced funding in October 2009. Since its inception, the NCC has carried out continuous marketing and promotion of nursing/midwifery as a career. Activities include:

- The production and dissemination of high-quality promotional materials, including stands, posters, and publications
- The development of a comprehensive NCC website
- Effective liaison with key stakeholders in the HEIs and health care sector, including meetings to address many policy issues
- Effective communication with guidance counsellors
- Participation at the Higher Options Conference

Provision of information to registered nurses and midwives

In 2009, three editions of Nursing/Midwifery: Career Development. Post-Registration Courses were published. This publication outlines the various post-registration education opportunities for registered nurses

and midwives. It includes sections on:

- Courses with An Bord Altranais approval (Category 2)
- Return to practice courses for nurses and midwives
- Financing of courses
- Contact details of all relevant organisations.

Evaluation of An Bord Altranais Regulatory Framework for Prescriptive Authority

The Evaluation of An Bord Altranais Regulatory Framework for Prescriptive Authority report was presented to the Minister for Health and Children on the 9th October 2009 at a National launch in The Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. The National launch of the Board's evaluation report was in association with University College Dublin study National Independent Evaluation of the Nursing and Midwife Prescribing Initiative study, which was commissioned and funded by the Health Service Executive on behalf of the National Resource and Implementation Group on Nurse and Midwife Prescribing in Ireland.

The report examined the regulation framework of:

- The Nurses Rules, 2007
- Requirements and Standards for Education Programmes for Nurses and Midwives with Prescriptive Authority
- Decision Making Framework for Nurses and Midwives with Prescriptive Authority
- Collaborative Practice Agreement for Nurses and Midwives with Prescriptive Authority
- Practice Standards for Nurses and Midwives with Prescriptive Authority
- The application and registration process for the Registered Nurse Prescribers Division of An Bord Altranais.

Research project to explore the Introduction of a National System to guide the Competence Assessment of registered nurse prescribers in Ireland

The project, agreed in 2008, presented a draft report that explored the beliefs and values of a broad range of stakeholders in relation to the guidance for and regulation of continued competence assessment, was

adopted by the Board of An Bord Altranais in April 2009. The report will be developed further and phase two will be considered by the Board in early 2010.

H1NI Virus

In May 2009, An Bord Altranais provided guidance on the Pandemic H1N1 2009 to nurses and midwives on the importance of vaccinations. Supplemental information on these issues was also produced in September 2009 which was made available for download on the An Bord Altranais website.

Audit of Education Department

Mazars conducted an audit of the regulatory Site Visit process during the week of 13th July 2009. The findings were submitted to An Bord Altranais to be reviewed and were discussed at the Audit meeting of 11th February 2010.

Strike Action

The Board of An Bord Altranais at its meeting on the 11th June 2009 discussed the "Guidance to Nurses and Midwives with regard to Strike Action" (An Bord Altranais 2006) and sent letters on this matter to all nurses on the register, to employers and to nursing unions. Nurses and midwives were also reminded via the newsletter of the guidance that "total withdrawl of nursing and midwifery care of patients/clients is inconsistent with the philisophy reflected in the Code of Professional Conduct for each Nurse and Midwife (April 2000) and the Scope of Nursing and Midwifery Practice Framework (April 2000)."

Nursing Care of Older People

Summary of Staff roles within the Education Department

A new way of managing the workload and assigning and clarifying responsibilities and accountability within the education department was agreed and implemented under the strategic management and leadership of the Chief Education Officer in January 2009. The new structure is summarised within six pillars of work. The Chief Education Officer assured the Board that quality decisions in relation to setting standards, monitoring their achievement and establishing compliance on behalf of An Bord Altranais could be accountably achieved in the structure.

The new structure is summarised within six pillars of work with an administrative support as outlined below:

- 1. Role Title: Education Officer Pre-Registration Education Ms. Judith Foley. Judith to manage all affairs related to pre-registration education programmes.
- 2. Role Title: Education Officer Post-Registration Education and Standards Mr. Thomas Kearns.

Thomas to manage all affairs related to post-registration and continuing education.

- Role Title: Education Officer Regulation Standards Ms. Maria Neary. Maria to manage all the education affairs of regulation for nurses trained outside Ireland.
- 4. Role Title: Professional Officer Standards of Practice and Guidance Ms. Kathleen Walsh. Kathleen to manage the guidance and ethics function of the Board.
- 5. Role Title: Education Officer Midwifery Education and Professional Standards. Person to be appointed.
- Role Title: Careers and Communications Officer Ms. Denise Carroll. Denise to manage the Nursing Careers Centre and communication with the profession including managing conferences and seminars.

2009 Accounts

The Auditors Report and the Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December, 2009, appear at page 32. The Income and Expenditure Account for the year to 31st December, 2009 shows a deficit on ordinary activities of €152,130. This compares with a surplus of €213,539 for the previous year.

There is a decrease in Income of €195,163 from 2008 to 2009 and this is mainly attributable to:

- A decrease of €152,167 in Registration Fee Income in 2009 from 2008, which is mainly due to the decrease in the number of applicants from abroad applying for registration in Ireland.
- In 2009, other miscellaneous income which is used to facilitate projects undertaken by An Bord Altranais showed a decrease of €221,990 over the amount received in 2008.
- Reduction in superannuation contributions receivable of €77,465.
- These were partly offset by an increase in annual retention fee income of €259,004.
- There is an increase in Expenditure of €170,506 from 2008 to 2009 and this is mainly attributable to
 increased Fitness to Practise costs which showed an increase of €543,562 over 2008. This increase
 can be attributed to an increased level of activity in the number of inquiries held during 2009. Also in
 relation to three Fitness to Practise Inquiries commenced in 2008, High Court proceedings were
 undertaken by the nurses involved against An Bord Altranais which resulted in increased legal costs.
- There were reductions in costs across a number of other areas to offset the effect of higher Fitness to Practise costs.
- The current year deficit is reflected in the financial position of An Bord Altranais as at 31st December, 2009, and the net worth of An Bord Altranais decreased by €152,130 in the year.

Premises

In 2006, An Bord Altranais completed the purchase of a new corporate premises at 18/20 Carysfort Avenue, Blackrock, Co. Dublin. The move to the new premises has proved highly successful. It provides excellent work accommodation for staff and also provides excellent meeting room facilities catering for all the needs of the Board and of the committees.

Internet

An Bord Altranais website, www.nursingboard.ie contains a comprehensive range of information and documents, including published guidance documents, annual reports and newsletters. Projects are ongoing, to increase the information and services provided on the website.

Partnership

The Partnership Committee, which was established in An Bord Altranais in 2000, was set up under the auspices of the National Health Service Partnership Forum and is comprised of representatives of management, staff, IMPACT and the INO.

Health and Safety

The Partnership Group oversees health and safety issues. In 2009, as in previous years, An Bord Altranais continued its efforts to ensure the safety, health and welfare of its employees and visitors to the organisation.

Prompt Payment of Accounts Act, 1997

An Bord Altranais has been prompt in the payment of its creditor accounts and the requirements of the Act do not pose any problem for the Board.

Staff changes

A number of staff left An Bord Altranais in 2009 to pursue other opportunities. We would like to thank them for their commitment and service and to wish them every success in their future careers. New staff members joined during the year and we wish them a fulfilling and enjoyable career in An Bord Altranais.

Fitness to Practise and Registration

An Bord Altranais report of the year 2009

fitness to practise

Fitness to Practise activity is governed by the provisions of Sections 38 – 46, Part V of the Nurses Act, 1985.

Sections 38 – 41 relate to applications for Inquiries, the conduct of Inquiries, Board consideration of inquiry reports and sanctions.

Applications for inquiry may be on the grounds of

- (a) alleged professional misconduct and/or
- (b) alleged unfitness to engage in nursing practice by reason of physical or mental disability.

The Board or any person may make an application for Inquiry.

Possible sanctions:

- Advise.
- Admonish.
- Censure.
- Attachment of conditions. Requires confirmation by the High Court.
- Suspension. Requires confirmation by the High Court.
- Erasure. Requires confirmation by the High Court.

Section 42 relates to individuals convicted of offences triable on indictment.

Section 44 relates to applications to the High Court, in the public interest, for an Order suspending registration.

Trends

The number of applications for Inquiries continued at broadly the same level as 2007 and 2008. This level is significantly higher than the level pre-2007. The number of registrants who were the subject of an application for Inquiry remains low as a percentage of the total number of registrants. In 2009 it equated to 0.1% of those on the Active Register. The increased number of applications over the last three years may be influenced by increasing public expectations with regard to standards of care and behaviour and greater public awareness of the fitness to practise referral process, possibly because of some high profile fitness to practise cases in other health professions. In addition, there would appear to be increased awareness of responsibilities in relation to public protection amongst nurse/midwife and other health managers, particularly if the nurse/midwife who is the subject of the application has left their employment.

Table I summarises the level of fitness to practise activity vis-à-vis the number of registrants over the last twelve years.

One additional Inquiry commenced but did not conclude by 31st December 2009.

Of the three Inquiries that commenced but did not conclude in 2008, two were still not fully concluded by 31st December, 2009 and matters in respect of the third concluded in 2009. The nurse was found guilty of professional misconduct and was advised in relation to her conduct and had conditions attached to her registration.

Nurses with Conditions attached to the retention of their names in the Register.

The monitoring of the Conditions attached to the retention of a nurse's name in the Register is a function of the Board.

In it's continuing of monitoring of such nurses during 2009, the Board removed the Conditions attached to the retention of the names of 5 nurses and partly removed Conditions attached to one other nurse.

Section 44 applications.

The Board, where it is of the opinion that it is in the public interest, may make an application to the High Court, so that during a specified period of time, a nurse's name does not have effect in the Register.

In 2009, the Board considered thirteen such applications.

- In five cases the Board decided to proceed with an application to the High Court. In all of these cases the Order was confirmed by the High Court.
- In five cases the Board accepted an undertaking from the nurse not to practice nursing and the Board did not proceed with an application to the High Court.
- In three cases the Board decided not to proceed with an application to the High Court.

Section 42 applications.

Under Section 42 of the Nurses Act, 1985, where a nurse is convicted of an offence triable on indictment, the Board may decide that the name of such person should be erased from the Register of Nurses.

There was **one case** considered by the Board in 2009 under this section of the Act. The Board decided not to apply to the High Court for an Order pursuant to Section 42 of the Nurse's Act, 1985, and referred the matter to the Fitness to Practise Committee for consideration pursuant to Section 38 of the Nurses Act, 1985.

Publication

This is in accordance with the revised An Bord Altranais publication policy approved on the 4th July 2007, which became fully operational in November 2009. Details of individual cases are published on the An Bord Altranais website, www.nursingboard.ie

The Register is maintained by An Bord Altranais in accordance with both provisions of the Nurses Act, 1985 and the Nurses Rules, 2010.

Certificate of Current Professional Status Requests (Verification requests)

Certificates of Current Professional Status (CCPSs) are issued on behalf of nurses/midwives who may wish to register abroad. CCPSs are sent directly from An Bord Altranais to the equivalent Competent/Regulatory Authority in the country/state where the nurse/midwife is seeking registration. A nurse/midwife may apply for more than one CCPS of registration in any given year.

- 2,714 individuals made a total of 3,193 CCPS requests in 2009.
- Of the **2,714** individuals who applied for a CCPS, **380** individuals submitted more than one request in 2009.

NOTE: A CCPS request **does not** necessarily equate to travel. A separate CCPS is issued for each Division of the Register.

President's statement on the systems of internal financial control

This Committee meets at least twice a year to review reports prepared by Internal Audit and other departments. Accounting Policies

1. Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

2. Fixed Assets - Depreciation

Depreciation is provided for at the rates stated below which are estimated to reduce the assets to realizable values by the end of their useful life.

4. Stock

This consists of badges stock and is valued at cost.

5. Library

No value has been placed on books and periodicals in the Library. Expenditure is written off in the year in which it occurs.

3. Bank Borrowing

KBC Bank holds a first fixed charge over 18/20 Carysfort Avenue, Blackrock, Co. Dublin. The Board financed the development of the premises in Blackrock by way of short term bank debt which was repaid from sale of 31/32 Fitzwilliam Square, and long term debt.

4. Superannuation Contributions

No provision has been made in respect of benefits payable under the Local Government Superannuation Scheme as the liability is underwritten by the Minister for Health and Children. Contributions from employees who are members of the scheme are credited to the income and expenditure account when received. Pension payments under the scheme are charged to the income and expenditure account when paid. Only those superannuation payments which fall due to be paid in the current year of account are charged to the current income and expenditure account. No charge is made to the current income and expenditure in respect of any liability for pension payments, which fall due in later years.

Permanent staff of An Bord Altranais are members of the Local Government Superannuation Scheme. Contributions are deducted from salaries at the rate of 5% in respect of Pensions and 1.5% in respect of Spouses and Orphans Scheme. Pensionable staff appointed after 6th April, 1995 are liable to pay Class A rates of PRSI and superannuation contributions of 3% of pensionable remuneration plus 3.5% of net pensionable remuneration. Superannuation Contributions include monies to be recouped from previous employers of six pensioners, relating to periods of service with these employers.

5. Staff Costs

Staff costs include €64,105 (2008 - €16,608) paid as retirement and lump sums to former staff members.

6. Nursing Careers Centre

The Department of Health and Children has assigned responsibility for the recruitment and selection of candidates for entry to nurse training to An Bord Altranais who established the Nursing Careers Centre to manage the process.

7. Prompt Payment of Accounts

An Bord Altranais is covered by the Prompt Payment of Accounts Act, 1997. The Act requires the Board to pay for goods and services by the prescribed payment date and if it fails to do so, pay an interest penalty. There is also a requirement to include details of payment practices in the Board's Annual Report. During 2009, An Bord Altranais complied in all material respects with the provisions of the Act.

8. Reserves

Accumulated Reserves 2009 amount to €13,285,992 (2008, restated €13,438,122) and represent the Accumulated Fund and the General Reserve.

Audit Committee

Terms of Reference:

- 1. Establishment
 - 1.1. The Board of An Bord Altranais shall establish a standing Committee to be known as the Audit Committee, in accordance with the terms of Section 13 (1) of the Nurses Act, 1985.

- 1.2. The Board shall review the constitution and terms of reference of the Committee periodically, as appropriate.
- 1.3. The Committee shall meet at least twice a year.
- 2. Membership
 - 2.1. Members of the Committee shall be members of the Board.
 - 2.2. The Committee shall consist of a minimum of 6 members, one of whom shall be the President of the Board or in the Presidents absence the Vice-President. The quorum for meetings shall be 3.
 - 2.3. The Board shall appoint a member of the Board, other than the President and Vice-President, to act as Chairperson of the Committee.
 - 2.4. In matters of accountability the Chief Executive Officer shall attend meetings of the Committee.
 - 2.5. Membership of the Committee shall be included in the annual report.
- 3. Scope and Definition of Activities
 - 3.1. The Committee shall ensure that effective systems, financial controls and procedures are in place and operating, to enable An Bord Altranais operate in an orderly, efficient and value--for-money manner.
 - 3.2. The Committee shall have:
 - Authority and the resources to investigate any matters within its terms of reference;
 - Full access to information; and
 - Authority to obtain external professional advice and to invite relevant experts to attend meetings if necessary.
- 4. External and Internal Audit
 - 4.1. The external auditor and the internal auditor shall be invited to attend meetings of the Committee at least once a year, without staff of the Board present, to discuss the annual audit of the Board's financial accounts and internal audit matters.
 - 4.2. The Committee shall ensure that there is an appropriate internal audit function, as specified under the Board's formal Charter for Internal Audit, to ensure that An Bord Altranais is fully compliant with all internal audit requirements under the Code of Practice for the Governance of State Bodies.
 - 4.3. The Committee shall periodically consult with the external auditor regarding the operation, resourcing and work programme of the internal audit function.
 - 4.4. The internal auditor shall report directly to the Committee and shall also have access to the President of An Bord Altranais and the Chairperson of the Committee.
 - 4.5. The Committee shall ensure that the independence of the internal and external audit functions is maintained.
 - 4.6. The internal auditor shall act on behalf of the Board in carrying out internal audits and no operational area or level within the organisation shall be precluded from internal audit review.
- 5. Reporting to the Board
 - 5.1. The Committee shall report and make recommendations to the Board on: External audit reports and requirements; Internal audit reports and requirements;
- 6. Confidentiality
 - 6.1 A Committee member shall not, without the consent of the Board, disclose confidential information obtained by him/her, or as a result of having performed, duties as a member of the Committee.

Education and Training Committee

Terms of Reference

- Establish the professional requirements and standards for nurse and midwifery education programmes including programmes leading to Registration;
- Provide an approval process to determine that third level institutions and health care institutions meet the requirements and standards for the provision of programmes leading to Registration;
- Monitor and evaluate standards in practice for the education and training of nurses and midwives;
- Satisfy itself as to the suitability of an institution to provide nursing and midwifery education approved by the Board;
- Satisfy itself as to the standards of theoretical and practical knowledge required for Registration with the Board;
- Ensure that the requirements relating to education and training of nurses and midwives for Registration satisfy the minimum standards specified in any Directive or Regulation adopted or made by the Council of European Communities which relates to qualifications required by nurses and midwives to secure Registration;
- Satisfy itself as to the adequacy and suitability of post registration courses for nurses and midwives provided by bodies recognised by the Board for that purpose;
- Engage in research into the education and training of nurses and midwives, including the formulation of experimental curricula and the evaluation of existing programmes;
- Maintain statistical records related to attrition from programmes and collate and present such records

for the purposes of manpower planning to the Department of Health and Children;

- Ensure through education and training that protection of the public is set in standards which ensure public confidence in nurses and midwives;
- Monitor on-going changes in service delivery and assess the impact of such change on pre-registration education syllabi and the assessment of competencies to enter the Register of Nurses;
- Provide guidance to the profession in relation to educational issues;
- Support the continuing professional development of nursing and midwifery through publications, seminars and conferences;
- Provide a quality assurance mechanism in partnership with service providers and education providers;

Membership of the Education and Training Committee:

- The committee shall be set up on the commencement of a Board's term of office for the duration of the Board;
- The number of members of the Committee shall not exceed 17 including the President and the Vice-President;
- Membership shall include at least 11 members of An Bord Altranais and no more than 5 places will be reserved for representatives of the third-level colleges 4 of whom should directly be involved in offering pre-registration nursing and/or midwifery programmes. The other position would be reserved for the representative of 'third level educational establishments' or 'a person who is experienced in the field of education' appointed by the Minister for Health and Children to An Bord Altranais;
- The 3 members to be appointed from the third-level colleges' constituency will comprise representation
 of the Universities and the Institutes of Technology involved in pre-registration education on a pro-rata
 basis of students within the particular educational sector;
- Membership of the colleges' constituency will be invited through the representative bodies of the Heads of the Colleges decided by the representative bodies;
- Membership from An Bord Altranais representing each of the divisions of the Register of Nurses includes 3 representatives each of education, management and practice;
- 1 member appointed to represent the Directors of Centres for Nurse/Midwife Education;
- 1 member appointed to represent the Directors of Nursing and Midwifery Planning and Development Units;
- The quorum for the Committee shall be 5;
- The committee shall meet at least four times a year.

Midwifery Committee


