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Presidential Address

During 2011 the Board and Executive discussed the detailed responses made in in the previous years to the draft Heads of Bill for the proposed new Nurses and Midwives legislation, which will replace the Nurses Act, 1985 with the Department of on a number of occasions and the Board are committed to working with the Minister and his officials in developing the new legislation. The Board welcomes the stated objective of the new legislation to protect the public in its dealings with both professions and to ensure the integrity of the professions through the promotion of high standards of education, training, practice and professional conduct.

I am pleased to report that a new set of requirements and standards for Post-Registration Nursing and Midwifery Education Programmes – incorporating the National Framework of Qualifications came into effect on 1st September, 2011 These requirements and standards represent a major revision to guidance for educational providers in relation to continuing and post registration education and training. These include major awards that are approved as An Bord Altranais Category 2 programmes. The document provides comprehensive guidance and will replace the current An Bord Altranais policy in this area.

The National Conference was held on Tuesday 17th May 2011 entitled Strengthening Patient Protection and Professional Integrity by Maintaining Professional Competence, with over 200 nurses and midwives from all over Ireland in attendance. The conference focused on the protection of the public by exploring diverse issues in maintaining professional competence.

This year's conference was followed by an interactive workshop with participants. The purpose of these workshops was to ascertain the beliefs and values of the conference attendees in relation to nurses and midwives in Ireland maintaining professional competence. A report on the findings of the workshop is published on the An Bord Altranais website. The Minister for Health Dr. James Reilly, T.D. addressed this year's conference.

Communicating more effectively with registered nurses and midwives was one of the Board's main strategic initiatives for 2011. Following on from a survey undertaken to find out the views of the professions on our current newsletter, the Board developed a newly designed newsletter which will be published biannually under the title Regulation Matters. The inaugural edition was published in November 2011. The revamped

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newsletter will replace the present quarterly newsletter. The content of the new newsletter will clearly reflect the functions of An Bord Altranais and the work that the board does.

In addition to the two hard copies of the newsletter, an eZine has been implemented in acknowledgement of the profession's needs. The eZine is a web-based newsletter that will maximize accessibility and convenience and will allow the Board to share its latest news in a more direct and efficient manner. The eZine is published on a monthly basis.

In 2011 the Education Department continued with they ongoing schedule of site visits and course approvals. The Nursing Careers Centre (NCC) continued to play a significant role in promoting nursing as a career. I am pleased to report that in 2011 a total of 8,977 individuals applied for 1,570 places on the various nursing programmes, including 2,287 mature applicants.

A major challenge continues to be the numbers of nurses wishing to register in Ireland. In 2011 the Board received 3, 054 applications for registration, compared with 2,858 applications in 2010. The number of applications from non EU applicants increased from 409 in 2010 to 479 in 2011 and applications from EU applicants increased from 497 in 2010 to 533 in 2011. The number of nurses on the Boards active register now stands at 67,130.

Statutory Instrument, S.I. No. 3 of 2010 Health (An Bord Altranais) (Additional Functions) Order 2010 gave An Bord Altranais responsibility to accredit Advanced Nurse Practitioner (ANP) and Advanced Midwife Practitioner (AMP) posts and to provide for the registration of individuals in the new Divisions of the Register known as the Advanced Nurse Practitioner Division and the Advanced Midwife Practitioner Division.

In 2011, An Bord Altranias continued its work in the area of advanced practice. 14 RANPs/RAMPs were assessed and registered in many areas of advanced practice: Site visits were carried out and 9 new advanced practice posts were accredited.

The Board continues to process increasing numbers of Fitness to Practise applications. In 2011the Board received 66 new applications and carried over a further 15 applications from 2010. Of these 51 cases were dealt with and 30 cases were still under consideration at the end of the year. The cost of processing Fitness to Practise cases is significant and continues to be monitored by the Board

I want to acknowledge our continuing close working relationship with the Department of Health and in particular the Nursing Policy Division. I very much appreciate the cooperation and expert assistance we received from the National Council for the Professional Development of Nursing and Midwifery, Health Service Executive, Voluntary Hospitals, Nursing and Midwifery Planning and Development Units and the Higher Education Authorities.

My final thanks go to the Chief Executive Officer and all her staff at An Bord Altranais for their work in administering the affairs of the Board with great professional competency.

Education and Training

An Bord Altranais, as required by the Nurses Act 1985 continues to promotes high standards of professional education, training and practice and professional conduct among nurses and midwives to ensure the protection of the public, throughout 2011. In the Education and Training functions assigned to it, it has continued to prescribe the manner in which and the conditions under which the registration/degree programme for General, Psychiatric and Intellectual Disability Divisions of the Register of Nurses since 2002, and a Children's and General Nursing (Integrated) programme and Midwifery programme since 2006 are provided. The concern of An Bord Altranais in the protection of the public acknowledges the issue of quality in education, actual clinical practice of nurses and midwives and the need for practice to be grounded in appropriate current evidence.

In keeping with its responsibility for protecting the public the Board continues its commitment to the effectiveness and efficiency of its approval processes. The Board through its quality of education framework continued its monitoring and evaluation role of standards in practice for the education and training of nurses and midwives throughout 2011.

An Bord Altranais operationalises this process through the Nurses Rules (2007) made under the Nurses Act, 1985 setting standards to be adhered to in the education and training of nurses and in their continuing education as registered nurses. The rules provide for the approval of higher education institutions and of hospitals and health care institutions providing training to ensure that valuable clinical and theoretical experience is provided. The various aspects of the regulatory functions being carried out are illustrated as follows:

Site visits to healthcare institutions and linked third level institutions

Under Section 34 of the Nurses Act, 1985 the Board is required to satisfy itself as to the adequacy and suitability of hospitals and institutions for nurse education and training at least once every five years.

On-site visits to Higher Education Institutions and Healthcare Institutions are required as a component of determining "the suitability of third level institutions and health care institutions in respect of educational programmes leading to registration" (Requirements and Standards for Nurse Registration Education Programmes, February 2005).

The focus of the site visit through a partnership approach is to:

- Assess that all statutory and regulatory requirements of An Bord Altranais and the European Directives are met.
- Assess the effectiveness and efficiency of the curriculum structures, processes and outcomes
- Assess the quality and appropriateness of the educational experiences

2011 Annual Reports

Annual Reports related to registration programmes of Nurse Education and Training were received and adopted from all colleges in respect of approved programmes and monitoring of conditions.

Post Registration Courses

The Board approves post-registration education courses for nurses and midwives based on criteria divided into two categories:

Post-Registration Category I Courses

Post Registration Category I courses include in-service education, seminars, study days, conferences and continued professional development (CPD) programmes that are not accredited by an academic awarding body, university or college.

Online CPD Directory

An Bord Altranais is committed to supporting a continuing education agenda, underpinned by patient safety and evidenced based practice. Continued Professional Development (CPD) consists of planned learning experiences which are designed to augment the knowledge, skills and attitudes of registered nurses and registered midwives for the enhancement of nursing and midwifery practice, education, administration and research.

In November 2010, the Board of An Bord Altranais approved the establishment of an online CPD Programme Directory. The Directory was launched in autumn 2011.

In-service training/education, seminars, study days, conferences and continued professional development activities that are not accredited by an academic awarding body, university or college can be submitted to An Bord Altranais for Category 1 Approval. Education providers requesting Category 1 approval submit a Category 1 Approval Submission Template and

must meet the criteria set down by An Bord Altranais for this approval. This approval is for one year at which time Educational providers must re-apply.

Category 1 approved courses can be searched for by topic, geographical region and/or through a key word search. The easy to use search facility will mean that registered nurses and registered midwives can quickly and simply access data in relation to in-service and continuing education programmes to address their own learning needs.

Programmes awarded An Bord Altranais Post Registration Category 1 approval is assigned An Bord Altranais Continuing Education Units (ABA CEU). This is in part resulting from the findings and recommendations of the evaluation of the An Bord Altranais Category 1 policy and process which revealed that Board approval should be based on a system of 1CEU=1 Hour. A review of the directory will be conducted within twelve months where users and educators will be provided with the opportunity to review and evaluate the directory. In 2011, 685 courses gained Category 1 approval.

Post-Registration Courses

A new set of Requirements and Standards for Post-Registration Nursing and Midwifery Education Programmes-Incorporating the National Framework of Qualifications came into effect on 1st September 2011.

These requirements and standards represent a major revision to guidance for educational providers in relation to continuing and post registration education and training. These include major awards that are approved as An Bord Altranais Category 2 programmes. The document provides comprehensive guidance and will replace the current An Bord Altranais policy in this area.

Post-Registration Category II courses are specialist education courses for nurses and midwives that support practice development and service need and exclude those which lead to registration. These courses are considered by the Education and Training Committee and approval is granted if programmes meet the criteria of the Education and Training Committee.

The categories of post registration programmes that An Bord Altranais approves include:

Post Registration Course Leading to an Additional Registration with An Bord Altranais

These are courses where upon successful completion the nurse/midwife is entitled to register on an additional division of the register. Currently there are five post registration programmes leading to additional registration with An Bord Altranais.

Post Registration Course Major Awards (Category 11 Approved Courses)

Category 2 programmes include a broad range of Major Award Courses excluding those leading to Registration with the Board. Specialist programmes are post registration programmes designed, developed and conducted with reference to a specific body of knowledge and experience in an area of nursing and midwifery. Such courses must satisfy the criteria of An Bord Altranais (1989) in relation to specialist education courses.

Post Registration Courses (Minor, Special and Supplemental Awards)

An Bord Altranais approves courses that are not major awards comprising minor awards, supplemental awards and special purpose awards. From the 1st September these courses must satisfy the criteria set out in the Requirements and Standards for Post-Registration Nursing and Midwifery Education Programmes - Incorporating the National Framework of Qualifications (An Bord Altranais, 2010).

- The standards and criteria shall be applied to determine the equivalence of programmes undertaken outside Ireland and for the period (January 2002 to September 2011) where programmes (not approved by An Bord Altranais) have been undertaken within the Republic of Ireland. This time frame will be ring fenced.

A sub-committee of the Education and Training Committee was formed to review programs outlined in number two above.

Register

Refuse Registration

Require that a period of adaptation and assessment must be successfully completed as a pre-requisite to registration with An Bord Altranais.

Appeals

An applicant may appeal a decision in the following instances:

Refusal of registration

Requirement to undertake adaptation and assessment

Failed period of adaptation and assessment.

In 2011, there were 11 appeals, 25% of whom were successful on presentation of new evidence.

European Council of Nursing Regulators

An Bord Altranais is a founding member of FEPI. The primary aim of FEPI is to protect the European citizens by securing excellence in:

The General Assembly of FEPI was held on 5th-6th July 2011 in Belgrade, Serbia. An Bord Altranais was represented by Mrs. Anne Carrigy, President and Dr. Anne-Marie Ryan, Chief Education Officer. The following issues were discussed:

- European Professional Cards

- Opportunity to explore a European Accreditation Council for Continued Nursing Education (EACCNE).

The FEPI Working Group on Education, Training and Competences was held on 5th September 2011. A response of FEPI to the Green paper was discussed.

Library

The Library continued to provide the following services:

Nursing Careers Centre

The Nursing Careers Centre (NCC) was set up under the management of An Bord Altranais in November 1998. Its main functions relate to:

- Assessment of mature code applicants to nursing/midwifery
- Promotion and marketing of nursing/ midwifery as a career
- Provision of information to registered nurses and midwives.

In carrying out its functions, the NCC continues to work closely with a number of key stakeholders, including: the Department of Health and Children; the health care sector; the Public Appointments Service (PAS); the Central Applications Office (CAO); the higher education institutions (HEIs); the Institute of Guidance

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Counsellors (IGC); the nursing promotion and marketing liaison group set up by the NCC, and others from time to time.

The NCC carries out its work in an open and transparent manner, with efficient and clear communication as its keynotes, and with due cognisance to the principle of cost effectiveness. The NCC communicates with the key stakeholders in reviewing its processes.

The number of applications to nursing/midwifery programmes in 2011 continues to be high, with a total of 8977 individual applicants for 1570 places. This figure is down minimally on 2010 figures (see Table below) and is accounted for by a decrease in standard code applicants. However, the overall ratio of applicants to places is unchanged from 2010 to 2011 at 6:1.

The total number of applications for standard code (presenting education results, regardless of age) places was 7146. This figure is down by a fraction on 2010 figures (n=59).

The total number of applications for mature code (23 years of age or over on 1st January 2011 and not presenting education results) places was 2287. This figure is marginally up by 55 on 2010 figures and is the highest number of mature applicants since the introduction of the degree programmes.

Applications to nursing/midwifery places by Discipline

Introduction of job simulation test 2011

The addition of the job simulation test to the aptitude test for mature code applicants was introduced in 2011 and feedback from the occupational psychologist at the PAS reported that it worked very well with a good spread of scores across each of the items.

In 2011 1620 applicants sat the test. Of those 979 passed which is a pass rate of 60%. A total of 400 people failed the tests but 201 failed the job simulation only. In 2010 at interview, 99 people were failed.

Provision of information to registered nurses and midwives

In 2011, five editions of Nursing/Midwifery: Career Development. Post-Registration Courses were published. This publication outlines the various post-registration education opportunities for registered nurses and midwives. It includes sections on:

- Courses leading to an additional registration
- Courses with An Bord Altranais approval (Category 2)
- Return to practice courses for nurses and midwives
- Financing of courses
- Contact details of all relevant organisations.

Communications

Communicating more effectively with registered nurses and midwives was one of the Board's main strategic initiatives for 2011. In the Autumn 2010 edition of the current newsletter, readers were informed of future changes regarding the newsletter. It was explained that the current newsletter was costly and inefficient, and in order to fund development of new communications channels, it would no longer be produced as a quarterly publication.

To consider the changes needed, a Newsletter Implementation Group was set up in An Bord Altranais to examine this issue. A survey was conducted to find out the views of the professions on our current newsletter. The information gleaned from the survey was utilized within the new strategy and a newly designed newsletter will be published biannually under the title Regulation Matters. The inaugural edition was published in November 2011. The revamped newsletter will replace the present quarterly newsletter. The content of the new newsletter

will clearly reflect the functions of An Bord Altranais and the work that the board does.

In addition to the two hard copies of the newsletter, an eZine has been implemented in acknowledgement of the profession's needs. The eZine is a web-based newsletter that will maximize accessibility and convenience and will allow the Board to share its latest news in a more direct and efficient manner. The eZine is published on a monthly basis.

Administration

The Auditors Report and the Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December, 2011, appear at page 29. The Income and Expenditure Account for the year to 31st December, 2011 shows a deficit on extraordinary activities of €3,950,098. This compares with a surplus of €333,322 for the previous year.

There is an increase in Income of €277,421 from 2010 to 2011 and this is mainly attributable to:

- An increase of €281,085 in Registration
 Fee Income in 2011 from 2010, which is
 mainly due to the increase in the number
 of applicants from abroad applying for
 registration in Ireland.
- There was an increase of €39,310 in Verification Fee Income in 2011 over 2010, which is due to an increase in the number of verifications issued to other regulatory authorities on behalf of nurses and midwives applying for registration abroad.

There is an increase in Expenditure of €4,560,841 from 2010 to 2011 and this is mainly attributable to:

- An adjustment to the property value to reflect the current value of the premises.
- In 2011, Fitness to Practise costs showed an increase of €69,925 over 2010. This increase can be attributed to an increased level of activity in the number of inquiries held during 2011.

Premises

In 2006, An Bord Altranais completed the purchase of a new corporate premises at 18/20 Carysfort Avenue, Blackrock, Co. Dublin. The move to the new premises has proved highly successful. It provides excellent work accommodation for staff and also provides excellent meeting room facilities catering for all the needs of the Board and of the committees.



Internet

An Bord Altranais website, www.nursingboard.ie contains a comprehensive range of information and documents, including published guidance documents, annual reports and newsletters. Projects are ongoing, to increase the information and services provided on the website.

Partnership

The Partnership Committee, which was established in An Bord Altranais in 2000, was set up under the auspices of the National Health Service Partnership Form and is comprised of representatives of management, staff, IMPACT and the INMO.

Health and Safety

The Partnership Group oversees health and safety issues. In 2011, as in previous years, An Bord Altranais continued its efforts to ensure the safety, health and welfare of its employees and visitors to the organisation.

Prompt Payment of Accounts Act, 1997

An Bord Altranais has been prompt in the payment of its creditor accounts and the requirements of the Act do not pose any problem for the Board.

Staff changes

A number of staff joined An Bord Altranais in 2011, notably the Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Maura Pidgeon, and the Director of Corporate Services, Mr. Peter Dennehy, we wish them them a fulfilling and enjoyable career in An Bord Altranais.

A number of staff left An Bord Altranais to pursue other opportunities. We would like to thank them for their commitment and service and to wish them every success in their future careers.



Regulation Fitness to Practise and Registration

Fitness to Practise

Fitness to Practise activity is governed by the provisions of Sections 38 – 46, Part V of the Nurses Act, 1985.

Sections 38 – 41 relate to applications for Inquiries, the conduct of inquiries, Board consideration of inquiry reports and sanctions.

Applications for inquiry may be on the grounds of

- (a) alleged professional misconduct and/or
- (b) alleged unfitness to engage in nursing practice by reason of physical or mental disability.

The Board or any person may make an application for Inquiry.

Possible sanctions:

- Advise.
- Admonish.
- Censure.
- Attachment of conditions. Requires confirmation by the High Court.

- Suspension. Requires confirmation by the High Court.
- Erasure. Requires confirmation by the High Court.

Section 42 relates to individuals convicted of offences triable on indictment.

Section 44 relates to applications to the High Court, in the public interest, for an Order suspending registration.

Trends

The number of applications for Inquiries and related fitness to practise activity remains largely unchanged from the previous year. The number of applications for an Inquiry should be set in the context of the number of individuals on the Register. The number of registrants who are the subject of an application for Inquiry remains low as a percentage of the total number of registrants. In 2011 it equated to 0.1% of those on the Active Register. The majority of applications are received from health service employers and managers.

Nurses with Conditions attached to the retention of their names in the Register.

The monitoring of the Conditions attached to the retention of a nurse's name in the Register is a function of the Board.

During 2011, the Board removed the Conditions attached to 5 nurses.

Section 44 applications

The Board, where it is of the opinion that it is in the public interest, may make an application to the High Court, so that during a specified period of time, a nurse's name does not have effect in the Register.

In 2011, the Board considered 19 such applications

- In twelve cases the Board decided to proceed with an application to the High Court. In nine of these cases the Order was confirmed by the High Court and in three cases the Court accepted an undertaking from the nurse.
- In six cases the Board accepted an undertaking from the nurse not to practice nursing and the Board did not proceed with an application to the High Court.
- In one case the Board decided not to proceed with an application to the High Court.

Section 42 applications

Under Section 42 of the Nurses Act, 1985, where a nurse is convicted of an offence triable on indictment, the Board may decide that the name of such person should be erased from the Register of Nurses.

There were three cases considered by the Board in 2011 under this section of the Act. In all three cases, the Board decided to apply to the High Court for an Order pursuant to Section 42 of the Nurse's Act, 1985, and Orders were granted.

3. Bank Borrowing

IIB Bank holds a first fixed charge over 18/20 Carysfort Avenue, Blackrock, Co. Dublin. The Board financed the development of the premises in Blackrock by way of short term bank debt which was repaid from the sale of 31/32 Fitzwilliam Square, and long term debt.

4. Superannuation Contributions

No provision has been made in respect of benefits payable under the Local Government Superannuation Scheme as the liability is underwritten by the Minister for Health. Contributions from employees who are members of the scheme are credited to the income and expenditure account when received. Pension payments under the scheme are charged to the income and expenditure account when paid. Only those superannuation payments which fall due to be paid in the current year of account are charged to the current income and expenditure account. No charge is made to the current income and expenditure in respect of any liability for pension payments, which fall due in later years.

Permanent staff of An Bord Altranais are members of the Local Government Superannuation Scheme. Contributions are deducted from salaries at the rate of 5% in respect of Pensions and 1.5% in respect of Spouses and Orphans Scheme. Pensionable staff appointed after 6th April 1995 are liable to pay Class A rates of PRSI and superannuation contributions of 3.0% of pensionable remuneration plus 3.5% of net pensionable remuneration. Superannuation Contributions include monies to be recouped from previous employers of six pensioners, relating to periods of service with these employers.

5. Staff Costs

There were no retirement pensions or lump sums paid to former staff in the year 2011.

6. Nursing Careers Centre

The Department of Health & Children has assigned responsibility for the recruitment and selection of candidates for entry to nurse training to An Bord Altranais who established the Nursing Careers Centre to manage the process.

7. Prompt Payment of Accounts

An Bord Altranais is covered by the Prompt Payment of Accounts Act, 1997. The Act requires the Board to pay for goods and services by the prescribed payment date and if it fails to do so, pay an interest penalty. There is also a requirement to include details of payment practices in the Board's Annual Report. During 2011, An Bord Altranais complied in all material respects with the provisions of the Act.

8. Reserves

Accumulated Reserves 2011 amount to €9,669,216, (2010 restated €13 619,314), and represent the Accumulated Fund and the General Reserve.



Audit Committee

Terms of Reference:

1. Establishment

- 1.1. The Board of An Bord Altranais shall establish a standing Committee to be known as the Audit Committee, in accordance with the terms of Section 13 (1) of the Nurses Act, 1985.
- 1.2. The Board shall review the constitution and terms of reference of the Committee periodically, as appropriate.
- 1.3. The Committee shall meet at least twice a year.

2. Membership

- 2.1. Members of the Committee shall be members of the Board.
- 2.2. The Committee shall consist of a minimum of 6 members, one of whom shall be the President of the Board or in the Presidents absence the Vice-President. The quorum for meetings shall be 3.
- 2.3. The Board shall appoint a member of the Board, other than the President and Vice-President, to act as Chairperson of the Committee.
- 2.4. In matters of accountability the Chief Executive Officer, shall attend meetings of the Committee.
- 2.5. Membership of the Committee shall be included in the annual report.

3. Scope and Definition of Activities

3.1. The Committee shall ensure that effective systems, financial controls and procedures are in place and operating, to enable An Bord Altranais operate in an orderly, efficient and value--for-money manner.

3.2. The Committee shall have:

- Authority and the resources to investigate any matters within its terms of reference;
- Full access to information; and
- Authority to obtain external professional advice and to invite relevant experts to attend meetings if necessary.

4. External and Internal Audit

- 4.1. The external auditor and the internal auditor shall be invited to attend meetings of the Committee at least once a year, without staff of the Board present, to discuss the annual audit of the Board's financial accounts and internal audit matters.
- 4.2. The Committee shall ensure that there is an appropriate internal audit function, as specified under the Board's formal Charter for Internal Audit, to ensure that An Bord Altranais is fully compliant with all internal audit requirements under the Code of Practice for the Governance of State Bodies.
- 4.3. The Committee shall periodically consult with the external auditor regarding the operation, resourcing and work programme of the internal audit function.
- 4.4. The internal auditor shall report directly to the Committee and shall also have access to the President of An Bord Altranais and the Chairperson of the Committee.
- 4.5. The Committee shall ensure that the independence of the internal and external audit functions is maintained.
- 4.6. The internal auditor shall act on behalf of the Board in carrying out internal audits and no operational area or level within the organisation shall be precluded from internal audit review.

5. Reporting to the Board

5.1. The Committee shall report and make recommendations to the Board on: External audit reports and requirements; Internal audit reports and requirements;

6. Confidentiality

6.1 A Committee member shall not, without the consent of the Board, disclose confidential information obtained by him/her, or as a result of having performed, duties as a member of the Committee.

In February, 2011 the Board increased the e membership of the Audit Committee from 6 to 9 members. In June, 2011 the Board was informed that the Audit Committee would be required to meet on a more frequent basis as the provisions of the new Act were implemented. As a result of this it was proposed that the Board increase the membership of the Audit Committee further. It was noted that meetings of the Finance and General Purpose Committee were held on the same day as the Audit Committee. The membership of the Audit Committee would now be 14 and a quorum of 7 would be required for meetings.

Education and Training Committee

Terms of Reference

- Establish the professional requirements and standards for nurse and midwifery education programmes including programmes leading to Registration;
- Provide an approval process to determine that third level institutions and health care institutions meet the requirements and standards for the provision of programmes leading to Registration;
- Monitor and evaluate standards in practice for the education and training of nurses and midwives;
- Satisfy itself as to the suitability of an institution to provide nursing and midwifery education approved by the Board;
- Satisfy itself as to the standards of theoretical and practical knowledge required for Registration with the Board;
- Ensure that the requirements relating to education and training of nurses and midwives for Registration satisfy the minimum standards specified in any Directive or Regulation adopted or made by the Council of European Communities which relates to qualifications required by nurses and midwives to secure Registration;
- Satisfy itself as to the adequacy and suitability of post registration courses for nurses and midwives provided by bodies recognised by the Board for that purpose;
- Engage in research into the education and training of nurses and midwives, including the formulation of experimental curricula and the evaluation of existing programmes;
- Maintain statistical records related to attrition from programmes and collate and present such records for the purposes of manpower planning to the Department of Health and Children;

- Ensure through education and training that protection of the public is set in standards which ensure public confidence in nurses and midwives;
- Monitor on-going changes in service delivery and assess the impact of such change on pre-registration education syllabi and the assessment of competencies to enter the Register of Nurses;
- Provide guidance to the profession in relation to educational issues;
- Support the continuing professional development of nursing and midwifery through publications, seminars and conferences;
- Provide a quality assurance mechanism in partnership with service providers and education providers;

Membership of the Education and Training Committee

- The committee shall be set up on the commencement of a Board's term of office for the duration of the Board;
- The number of members of the Committee shall not exceed 17 including the President and the Vice- President;
- Membership shall include at least 11 members of An Bord Altranais and no more than 5 places will be reserved for representatives of the third-level colleges 4 of whom should directly be involved in offering pre-registration nursing and/or midwifery programmes. The other position would be reserved for the representative of 'third level educational establishments' or 'a person who is experienced in the field of education' appointed by the Minister for Health to An Bord Altranais;

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- The 3 members to be appointed from the third-level colleges' constituency will comprise representation of the Universities and the Institutes of Technology involved in pre-registration education on a pro-rata basis of students within the particular educational sector;
- Membership of the colleges' constituency will be invited through the representative bodies of the Heads of the Colleges decided by the representative bodies;
- Membership from An Bord Altranais representing each of the divisions of the Register of Nurses includes 3 representatives each of education, management and practice;
- 1 member appointed to represent the Directors of Centres for Nurse/Midwife Education;
- 1 member appointed to represent the Directors of Nursing and Midwifery Planning and Development Units;

- The quorum for the Committee shall be 5;
- The committee shall meet at least four times a year.

- To develop a position statement for consideration by the Board in respect of ethical issues, as the need arises, that affect the public, the profession and the Board, encompassing professional dilemmas and bioethical issues.

Membership of the Ethics Committees:

 The Ethics Committee shall be a separate committee of the Board;

- Membership of the Ethics Committee shall not exceed eleven and shall be determined by the Board at its first meeting;
- Two expert members to be appointed;
- The Ethics committee shall include representation of the public interest;
- The quorum for the Ethics Committee shall be seven.

Midwifery Committee

Terms of Reference

- 4. The elected member of the Board representing midwives engaged in clinical practice in midwifery.
- 5. One appointed member of the Board representative of the interest of the general public.
- 6. The Midwifery Advisor in the Department of Health and Children.*
- 7. A midwife representative of third level educational institutions engaged in the education of midwives.*
- 8. A midwife engaged in independent domiciliary midwifery practice.* (As recommended by the Report of the Commission on Nursing).
- The chairperson of the committee shall be the President of the Board;
- The quorum for meetings of the committee shall be four.
- * As provided for in Section 13 (3) of the Nurses Act, 1985.


