Nursing Regulation for the last 100 Years: 1950 to Date

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Legislation of Nursing 1950 – present

Nurses Act 1950

- Established An Bord Altranais
- Make further and better provision for the registration, certification, control and training of nurses
- 23 members with 10 elected nurses, 13 ministerial appointees incl. 6 Doctors, 1 educator, 2 reps of local government and 2 nurses.
- President appointed by the Minister
- 5 year term
- Rules for courses of training and examinations for candidates for registration in the register of nurses

Nurses Act 1985

- Provide for the registration, control and education of nurses and midwives
- 29 members 17 elected by the nursing profession
- Live register
- Minimum entry requirements to training
- Fitness to practise committee
- Competent authority
- Review and evaluate education
 programmes
- Give guidance ... in all matters relating to ethical conduct and behaviour.
- Elect President from its members

Nurses and Midwives Act 2011


- Enhancement of the protection of the public in its dealings with nurses and midwives
- 23 members New composition of the Board – 8 elected
- New name- New Register
- Greater accountability, openness and transparency
- New approach to handling of complaints and dealing with fitness to practise matters
- New duties and responsibilities in relation to education and training and maintenance of competence

Nurses Act 1950

50.The Board may, in accordance with rules, provide or make provision for the courses of training and examinations to be taken by candidates for registration in the register of nurses and may prescribe the manner in which and the conditions under which training shall be provided

54.—The Board may, on such terms and conditions as the Minister *may approve, provide institutional, hostel or other accommodation for persons attending courses of training who are nurses, or candidates for registration in the register of nurses.*

66.—The Board may, and if so required by the Minister shall, conduct, or cause to be conducted, research into matters relating to the organisation or practice of nursing or the training of nurses.



Evolution of Nurse Education in Ireland - Apprentice Model until 1994

Two essentials required of the nurse: "quality or the desire to serve, adequate intelligence and a pleasing personality" (Cunningham, 1959) "A national need to relate the training of nurses to the needs of the countries hospitals and public health services" CMO (1949)


"Properly trained personnel in adequate numbers for the nursing services in the years ahead" Dr Noel Browne (1949)

The dependence of hospitals on student nurses to provide 60-80% of the nursing services shows how illusionary the educational experience is ...learning becomes centred on the technical and routine aspects of care"(WHO, Maillert 1973)



Nurses Act 1985

- An Bord Altranais from 1985 began using information technology for its nursing registers rather than bound paper volumes.
- 29 member board 17 elected members of the professions
- Self-financing
- Diploma in Nursing 1994
 - Non-means tested grant
- Degree in Nursing 2002
 - 13 HEI's
 - 36 weeks paid internship in year 4

Nurses and Midwives Act 2011

- Enhancement of the Protection of the Public
- Confidence and competence of the professions
- Quality Assurance mechanisms
- Integrity of practice
- Public confidence in service provision
- Midwifery separate profession

The purpose of the Board is:

"the protection of the public in its dealing with nurses and midwives and the integrity of the practice of nursing and midwifery through the promotion of high standards of professional education, training and practice and professional conduct among nurses and midwives".

(Section 8, Nurses and Midwives Act 2011)
