Why have a Fitness to Practise process?

- Protect the public
- Uphold professional standards
- Uphold public confidence in the profession
- An essential component of Professional Regulation



Steps of the FTP Process: Nurses and Midwives Act 2011

- STEP 1. Complaint → Preliminary Proceedings Committee (Screening)
- STEP 2. Complaint closed or referred to FTP Inquiry
- STEP 3. FTP Inquiry Report considered by Board
- STEP 4. High Court confirmation of sanction.



Suspension from the Register

- Emergency procedure under section 58 of the 2011 Act
- Board can apply to the High Court to suspend a nurse from the Register
- Basis: To protect the public <u>if allegations are</u> <u>true</u>, there is an immediate risk to the public.



Criminal Convictions

- If conviction for a serious offence ("triable on indictment") – Board can decide to cancel registration or refer to PPC.
- Conviction for offence not triable on indictment may be the subject of a complaint or no further action taken.



Complaints – who and what?

- Significant increase in number of complaints up 90% from 2016 → 2017. Increase maintained.
- Majority of complaints now from the public clinical practice issues, especially poor communication.
- Complaints from employers inappropriate or dishonest behaviour. Many linked to health issues.



Changes to the 2011 Act

- Changes currently going through the legislative process
- Will make the process somewhat simpler
- Process still complex union or legal representation very important
